

Methodology



The margin of error for this survey at the 95% confidence level is ±3.00% on the overall sample. The margin of error on sub-samples is greater.


In general, would you say things in NYS are headed in the right direction or off on the wrong track? N=415



In general, would you say things in your community are headed in the right direction or off on the wrong track? N=385




Q.4 Which of the following do you think is the most important issue facing New York State at this time?



How Do Voters View Public Figures?






Q.8 In your opinion, does NYS currently spend too much money on infrastructure such as roads and bridges, spend too little money, or spend the right amount?


Q.9 On a scale of zero-to-ten, with zero being the least and ten being the most, how satisfied are you with the condition of NYS' roads?

0-2 Rating = 19% 8-10 Rating = 11%




Q.10 On a scale of zero-to-ten, with zero being the least and ten being the most, how satisfied are you with the condition of NYS' bridges?



Positive Messages

{Public Safety} New York State has some of the most deteriorated roads and bridges in the country, with thousands in poor and fair condition. This poses a major risk to public safety.

{Create Jobs} Increasing state funding for infrastructure will create thousands of good-paying local jobs for New Yorkers.

{Cost to Drivers} All those potholes and deteriorating roads cost New Yorkers an average of \$580 a year in additional vehicle maintenance costs.

{Focus on Critical Projects} While the state tends to invest in large, big-ticket projects, like airports, it is severely behind in investing in everyday, critical infrastructure like local roads and bridges which allow New Yorkers to travel safely and efficiently.

{Traffic Congestion} In the state's most congested areas, drivers lose up to nearly two-thousand dollars a year and as many as ninety-two hours sitting in traffic.

{Reduce Carbon Emissions} Dilapidated roads and bridges create major traffic congestion across the state. The more New Yorkers who sit idle in traffic, the more carbon emissions are emitted into the air. Investing in 21st century roads and bridges will reduce carbon emissions.

{Cost to New York} Congested and unsafe infrastructure costs New Yorkers billions of dollars every year. This costs the average New York family \$3,000 annually. Investing in roads and bridges puts that money back in their pockets.

(Social Justice) New York State's antiquated infrastructure has a disproportionately negative impact on communities of color. Across the state, neighborhoods where black and brown people reside are often divided by major highways, which expose residents to high levels of air and noise pollution. The state should invest in roads and bridges to correct these injustices.


{Gas Taxes} New York's drivers pay some of the highest gas taxes in the country, adding forty-six cents to the cost of every gallon of gas, costing New York drivers two-billion-dollars annually. Yet, less than half of these gas tax revenues are dedicated to road and bridge construction.

{Renewable Energy} Increasing state funding for infrastructure would allow the state to upgrade its green transportation network by adding more charging stations for electric vehicles and allowing more use of renewable energy.
